# The Francis Effect?

Those of us in the United States are still basking in the after-glow of Pope Francis' visit to the United States. During his time in the US, Pope Francis addressed a wide-range of topics: the environment, concern for migrants and refugees, the poor, and the family as the bedrock of society. His insights, compassion and mercy have touched people throughout the world and raised our consciousness on many societal issues.

How often have we heard that this Pontiff has renewed people's faith commitment, their zeal, their desire to serve God and others? To this end, some religious communities are now experiencing a growth in the number of midlife vocations. Some religious orders are welcoming women in their 40s and 50s who believe that God is calling them to religious life.

Why are mature-age women attracted to religious life? Certainly, they seek a deeper relationship with God. They long to experience community life with others who seek to love and serve God. The desire for a deepened living faith compels them. These women in their 40s and 50s may provide a "bridge generation" that could possibly make some religious communities a viable option for women in their 20s and 30s who are also discerning religious life.

How have mature-age women coming into community changed the formation process? Religious communities have become more conscious of treating women in formation not as the adolescents of the community, but as the mature women they are! The mature-age women's presence in community helps to nurture the growth of the younger women, also.

Mature-age women have a deep desire to use their well-developed life skills in service. Communities who are welcoming women in their 40s and 50s have provided opportunities for the women to blossom at a personal level and in turn, these women have contributed much to the communities as a whole.

In one Benedictine community, their experience is that mature-age women seem to adjust to community life more easily if they have been married and have children. Women who have raised children alone; worked full time to make ends meet; and have juggled jobs, children and household management have developed patterns of behavior rooted in sacrificing themselves for others. Women who have matured in their relationship with God recognize God's role in bringing them through painful life experiences. These women have become strong women of faith. Their potential contribution deserves a closer look.


