

National Vocation Awareness Week

Calls Catholics to Foster a Culture of Vocations



A culture of vocations is one that provides the necessary support for others to hear and respond to God's call in their lives.

The Catholic Church in the United States will celebrate National Vocation Awareness Week, **November 1 – 7, 2015.** This observance, sponsored by the U.S. bishops' Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations, is a special time for parishes and all Catholics in the United States to foster a culture of vocations for the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life.

Pope Francis, in his message of April 26, 2015 on the 52nd Day of World Prayer for Vocations, stated, "Responding to God's call means allowing Him to help us leave ourselves and our false security behind, and to strike out on the path which leads to Jesus Christ, the origin and destiny of our life and our happiness." The Holy Father stresses, "The Christian vocation, rooted in the

contemplation of the Father's heart, thus inspires us to solidarity in bringing liberation to our brothers and sisters, especially the poorest."

National Vocations Awareness Week is designed to help promote vocation awareness and to encourage young people to ask the question: "To what vocation in life is God calling me?"

Encouraging others to recognize the promptings of the Holy Spirit and to follow Christ without reservations are key elements in supporting a culture of vocations," said Bishop Michael F. Burbidge of Raleigh, North Carolina. "With God's grace, we can have a positive impact on others who may be open to considering a vocation to priesthood or religious life, by simply inviting them to think and pray about it. Our enthusiasm and willingness to speak directly to others about vocations just might be the conversation someone needs to respond to God's call."

"Over and over again when asked, newly ordained priests and newly professed women and men religious, credit the encouragement of family members, co-workers, friends and clergy, as being a significant factor in their pursuing a vocations," said Fr. Ralph O'Donnell, USCCB's executive director of Clergy, Consecrated Life and Vocations.

CIS-NYC strives to create positive change in the lives of individuals and the community by fostering justice, dignity, and respect. We have been able to provide essential legal and social services to immigrants and low-income residents of the Lower East Side of Manhattan in the last year through multiple programs.

Within the last year CIS-NYC accomplished the following:

- Distributed 5,387 healthy, balanced, and culturally appropriate food packages to feed 13,400 individuals
- Served 130 adult students through our free English, literacy, computer, and citizenship classes
- ❖ Offered expert immigration legal services to **503** clients on a wide range of issues and closed **303** cases
- ❖ Helped 12 clients become American citizens
- Completed 114 applications for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) so that our young immigrant students can obtain employment authorizations and live free of the fear of deportation
- ❖ Aided 30 immigrant students through our College Readiness program in pursuing higher education and awarded 7 students scholarships totaling more than \$8,000
- Hosted "Know Your Rights" informational workshops which 150 individuals attended

Patients And Community To Benefit From Cabrini Malvern Upgrade

Current and future patients of Cabrini health service will benefit from lifesaving cardiac, acute geriatric, medical imaging and radiotherapy services, with a new facility to be built at Cabrini's Malvern campus subject to [the approval of local governing authorities].

Cabrini Chief Executive Dr. Michael Walsh says the new clinical building is an essential and inevitable upgrade given the design and length of service of some of Cabrini Malvern's older buildings.

"For 67 years, Cabrini has provided care and support to our community with compassion, integrity, courage and respect. The Cabrini Sisters opened the original 'new hospital' in 1958 and it has cared for tens of thousands of patients for almost 60 years.

"Over the decades, hospital care has changed and the needs of our community have changed," said Dr. Walsh.

"In 2015, we are caring for an increasing number of elderly patients, many of whom have chronic cardiac, respiratory and other conditions. Our facilities need new and improved design to meet the needs of these patients and their families and to provide the best working environment for our doctors and staff.

More convenient access to radiotherapy cancer treatment will be a key feature of the new clinical building. "Currently, patients who need radiotherapy have to be treated elsewhere. We will soon be able to provide fully integrated cancer care to meet the needs of the Cabrini community," said Dr. Walsh.

Dr. Walsh says the new building would include an expanded maternity unit with a multidisciplinary, integrated model of care for pregnant women and their families. "Currently 2000 babies are delivered each year at Cabrini and there is a high level of demand for this service. The new facility will ensure we can continue to offer the very best level of care for the community," he said.

The new clinical building, located on Cabrini's current footprint, will include:

- A new radiotherapy centre and a contemporary day oncology unit with an emphasis on the patient experience
- Expanded maternity facilities and an upgraded special care nursery
- A new cardiac services unit to urgently treat issues of cardiac rhythm and cardiac failure
- An acute geriatric medical unit to meet the needs of elderly, frail, or cognitively impaired patients
- An improved emergency department, which will enable us to treat our increasingly complex patient presentations

- Medical wards for the treatment of neurology, stroke and infectious diseases
- A greater proportion of single patient rooms across all new levels

Dr. Walsh said the project has been well received by the Cabrini community so far. "We're looking forward to keeping the community informed about this project and will provide regular updates on the Cabrini website," Dr. Walsh said.

Face to Face with Homelessness



Through my senior capstone project at Cabrini College, I visited the Friends Association in West Chester, PA, with a few of my classmates and my professor. We were able to interview two clients who had experience homelessness or who had come close to being homeless.

These two women and their families were referred to a network of helpful resources that are made possible by an organization called Decade to

Doorways. This organization has a five-year plan to [hopefully] completely eliminate homelessness in Chester County, PA. They work with multiple organizations that share the same goal.

Decades to Doorways graciously allowed us to interview two of their clients who were able to give us more insights on homelessness.

Our first interview of the day was with someone we will call "Jane". "Jane" was nearly homeless because of a bedbug infestation that took over her small apartment in Coatesville, PA. She refused to have her children live in that environment, so she turned to her landlord hoping that he would be able to bring in an exterminator. The landlord turned down her request. "Jane" realized that she could not afford an exterminator on her own, so she took

to the streets to find somewhere else for her family to live. Through Decade to Doorways, she was put in contact with an organization that opened new housing possibilities. She is currently on the road to stable housing and new job opportunities.

The second person we interviewed was "Pearl". Because of a job transition, "Pearl's" income became less than her cost of living. She reached out to Decade to Doorways for help in staying on top of her bills while managing a shifting income. This organization was able to communicate with her landlord [to explain the situation] and to point "Pearl" to a new job with better income potential.

Our time at the Friends Association was certainly eye opening, and for me, life changing. The stories of "Jane" and "Pearl" were so poignant. We can't ever fully appreciate another until we take the time to know them. ~submitted by Cabrini College intern Christle Gehman

THE PRACTICE OF MINDFULNESS

Fr. Edwin Robinson, O.F.M., Director of Pastoral Care at Cabrini of Westchester, is leading a group of Cabrini staff in the Practice of Mindfulness as part of a series in services to promote the health and wellbeing of Cabrini staff. In a very busy and often distracted world, the practice of mindfulness allows the group to enter into the present moment, and experience its calm and peace. In 1998, Fr. Edwin attended an eight-day retreat led by the Buddhist Monk, Thich Nhat Hanh. He has been practicing Mindfulness Meditation since that time.



The words of Psalm 104:10a, "Be still, and experience the 'I am' of my divine presence," sum up the "how" of the practice. The group is meeting for a series of six - thirty minutes sessions. Fr. Edwin invites the participants to sit in such a way that they are aware of the dynamics of the present moment, in themselves individually and as a group. In the creation stories of Genesis, the authors have God declare, "It is not good for the human person to be alone." (Gen. 2:1).






Modern psychology also asserts that we humans are essentially social beings. For this reason group practice of mindfulness is the best way to learn the practice for it accelerates its benefits. However, mindfulness is also practiced individually. The road taken by Fr. Edwin from the 1998 retreat to years of individual and group practice is a good example of why the group setting is a good place to learn the practice.

In the beginning, those who practice mindfulness find that it is not as easy as it sounds. However, almost immediately the beneficial aspects of the practice can be felt, even if only

for brief moments. These benefits are the reason why those who begin the practice and persevere make it an integral part of their daily lives.

So far, the staff who have participated in the series attest to its benefits. Fr. Edwin emphasizes that the members of the group need to be gentle with themselves and everyone in the group. He also highlights the reality that each person is essentially defined by his or her humanity. Hence, titles and functions fade away as the members of the group enter into the present moment and experience the wonder of who they are as human beings.


