Commonwealth of PA Awards Cabrini University \$1M to Advance Strategic Plan

Cabrini University has been awarded \$1 million in state funds to further support a pedestrian-centric campus and advance sustainable growth on campus.

The grant was part of the Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP) awarded by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.





Fostering the University's strategic plan, the RACP funds will aid in the development of a new parking structure on the southern part of campus, providing the flexibility to transform the center of campus to be vehicle-free.

"This grant ensures that our vibrant campus continues to attract top-notch students and professionals," said Donald B. Taylor, Ph.D., President of Cabrini University. "We thank the Wolf Administration, Rep. William Adolph, and Sen. Daylin Leach for helping us

provide the foundation to support our growing community."

From the Province Vocation Promotion Team...

I'm over 40. Can I still join religious life?

This is the <u>third</u> instalment of an article that appears in the VISION Vocation Guide by Sr. Adrienne Kaufmann, OSB and Br. Ronald Hingle, SC.

Not all religious communities accept candidates over the age of 40 (the MSCs welcome women on an individual basis, but generally will invite women ages 18 – 45 to apply for candidacy). In this series of articles we will explore the questions and answers that mature candidates often have.

This week, we focus on family and marital concerns...

If I have children, am I still able to enter religious life?

Br. Ronnie: According to canon law, children of candidates need to be at least 18 years of age and financially independent before their parent can enter religious life. However, most communities would consider more than the chronological age of the children. Are the children mentally, physically, psychologically, and emotionally capable of caring for themselves? Even if an annulment has been granted and the children are living with the other parent, what, if any type of support is needed from the parent desiring to enter religious life? Basically, is the person entering truly free and available to fully enter this type of lifestyle without major distractions?





Sr. Adrienne: When a parent or grandparent enters community, the personal cost is high. Less frequent contact with families is inevitable. Juggling two life commitments: religious life and parenting/grandparenting is demanding. The discernment process for parents needs to include a subset of questions you ask a community: How often will I be able to visit my family? Will they be able to visit me? How are visits handled? Am I able to interact via electronic media and telephone often enough to maintain a good relationship? Does the formation program allow for extra time with my family? Does the religious community honor my dual role?

Does a divorce make me ineligible for religious life?

Sr. Adrienne: A divorced man or woman who enters religious life needs the diocesan marriage tribunal's involvement. Canon law requires an annulment or "indult of nullity" before entry into community. This is true for both men and women.

Next week: We will address further considerations for persons over 40 who might be thinking of the consecrated life.

The Lord has done great things for us and we are happy! On Saturday, October 1st, we had a beautiful vocational meeting in our Cabrini High School (CHS) in New Orleans. Twelve

young people from different parishes and also of different ages, participated in the activity. Ten of them came in person, brimming with enthusiasm, feeling that the Lord has called them and the two others, participated in the meeting by Skype.

It was an unforgettable encounter, where everyone was open to hear the experiences related by the other. We

were amazed to hear how the Lord calls when He wants and in the most amazing and unimaginable ways! Some expressed, with tears, the emotion of being "chosen". Others like one of the Cabrini High School students - shared joyfully how during the Open House held by the High School - that when she entered the room of Mother Cabrini [which is in the Esplanade Building of the High School], that she felt that she wanted to study at CHS and wanted to give her whole life to the service of immigrants. We cried, we laughed, we ate, we shared ... And at the end of our meeting we hugged each other promising to continue to pray for our vocations!

There is definitely an awakening of young religious vocations in women in New Orleans, and although, currently, most young people who become priests or religious are typically in their thirties or older, it is likely that the roots of these [budding] vocations were established in their teens or even earlier. So, we believe it is important to heed their concerns and provide support and accompaniment for these young women who dare to express what they feel their hearts.

May the Lord grant us many and holy vocations and that the garden that Mother Cabrini cultivated in the United States of America, continues to flourish, for us to continue being "Bearers of Christ in the world."
