

Pioneering and Dynamic St. Frances Xavier Cabrini

On November 13th we will celebrate the Feast Day of our Patroness St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, who was truly a pioneer in international missionary work and a dynamic role model to follow in the 21st century.

Mother Cabrini's pioneering spirit was manifested early on, even before she founded the MSCs, as she grew in discernment, courage and energy, her capacity for relationship, her drive and tenacity. She learned early in her life how to deal with setbacks, blocks and frustrations: a gift she had learned from her deep and intimate prayer life and her loving relationship with the Sacred Heart of Jesus, her spouse and her model. She was a very passionate woman – passionate to help others, passionate in overcoming the difficulties which were always assailing her, passionate in deepening a gospel spirituality not only in her sisters but also in those to whom she and her sisters were ministering. Through the years, Mother Cabrini had become expert at handling struggles and adversities, always maintaining her peace and always alert to the needs of others, especially the poor, the marginalized, the immigrant. She had a far-sighted vision of mission and had planted her Institute in eight countries by the time she died [in 1917].

What was her secret? Where did all this energy and insight come from? From an early age, Frances knew how to immerse herself in the depths of the Heart of Jesus and Scripture. She took every problem she had to the Heart of Jesus who inevitably showed her his love for her, how to resolve her difficulties, what he wanted from her, and what her priorities had to be.



Mother Cabrini was always writing in her diary and we are so blessed to have these intimate glimpses into her heart and soul, her passion and energy, her love and zeal. She was truly "a contemplative missionary" and she encouraged all her sisters to be the same. Today that is the same challenge that is offered to every Missionary Sister of the Sacred Heart of Jesus,

every Cabrini Lay Missionary, every Cabrini collaborator and employee who is called to serve the Lord and his people with compassion and zeal, determination and farsightedness.

Let us continue to seek and establish new outlets for this passionate Cabrinian spirit throughout the world, bringing Mother Cabrini's charism, not only where and how the Cabrinian Family is currently, but also to new spaces and new missions where together sisters and laity alike, can spread our charism and zeal to the people of God. What a blessing it is for us in the Cabrinian Family in the 21st century to have such a legacy, a far-sighted vision of mission "to the ends of the earth"! ~ Sister Patricia Spillane, MSC

From the Foreword to St. Frances Cabrini, a Passionate Life by Mark Davis

A MISSIONARY AT HEART

As we prepare to celebrate the Feast of St. Cabrini on November 13th, we are pleased to share this story on Sr. Alice Zanon, MSC. This article first appeared in **The Beat**, the news magazine of Cabrini Health in Australia. Given the extensive nature of this account, we will share the story of Sr. Alice over the next few weeks.



Sr. Alice identifies not as Australian, Italian, English or American – she is at heart, a Missionary Sister, always ready to go wherever she is sent to carry on the work of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini and her congregation.

Sr. Alice Zanon, MSC is unfazed by the dynamic life she has led as a Cabrini Sister. As a first-generation Australian daughter of Italian parents, she was raised in the Melbourne suburb of Brunswick East. She entered the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus aged 23 in Malvern in 1968. Prior to that, Sr. Alice had been working in a secretarial capacity to the managers of an insurance firm in Collins Street and at the resources firm Ampol Petroleum. During her lunchbreaks, this young city

woman would attend Mass at St. Francis Catholic Church in Lonsdale Street, Melbourne. Her colleague and friend Greta noticed how happy Alice always looked after she had attended Mass and received Holy Communion and asked whether she had thought of entering religious life. Indeed, she had. "I perceived a calling to enter religious life but procrastinated, as I did not know where to go," said Sr. Alice.



While working with the Legion of Mary and during a weekend stay at Ave Maria Retreat House for Women in the Melbourne suburb of Essendon, Alice sought the counsel of the late Rev. John Robinson, a Vincentian priest, to whom she opened her heart about her desire for religious vocation. He told her about the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and their work at Cabrini Malvern. She learned there were 22 Sisters missioned there including Sisters who worked in administrative roles. Alice saw a place there for herself and made contact with Sr. Ilia Xavier Peveralia MSC, who was Superior and Hospital Administrator from 1968 until 1973. "I was drawn by the international nature of the community – seven nationalities were represented among these Sisters and as a child of immigrants, I never looked anywhere else," said Sr. Alice. She remembers the late Sr. Ilia with great affection. "She was a good, kind, compassionate Sister, a mentor and a friend," said Sr. Alice.

Sr. Alice entered religious life on Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini's Feast Day (13 November) in 1968 and made her perpetual vows in February 1978. "It was a good day to enter," she said. Her decision made, it was time to break the news to her parents – mother Serena and father Segundo Diano, comanager at a concrete and paving firm – who were initially devastated, as they felt that they were losing their precious daughter. "My father took the news particularly hard but my mind was made up."

As Italian immigrants, Alice's parents had worked hard to provide Alice, her sister Dina and two brothers Danny and Angelo with a good education, a better life than they themselves had had and a comfortable future. Alice and her siblings attended Mass regularly and went to Catholic schools. Alice had

attended Our Lady Help of Christians primary school in Brunswick East and later, Academy of Mary Immaculate in Fitzroy where she was taught by the Sisters of Mercy. Her siblings are alive today and themselves grandparents. Sr. Alice sees them on her infrequent visits to Australia, which included attending the Feast of the Sacred Heart Mass in the chapel at Cabrini Malvern in June 2015.

While missioned in Australia, Sr. Alice was among four Cabrini Sisters who went to Perth to serve at a home for assisted living where she remained for four years. Whereas three Cabrini Sisters worked in this home, Sr. Alice worked at a kindergarten for Italian children operated by the Italian Consulate. To acquire further training as an educator, she attended the Churchlands Teaching College (now part of Edith Cowan University). "I had not expected to become a teacher," she said. "Yet the seed fell, took root and all fell into place."

The group began the tour in Milan and then traveled to Codogno, Sant' Angelo, Florence, Siena, Assisi and Rome. Each city included tours and visits to beautiful basilicas, cathedrals, duomos, Holy Doors for



the Year of Mercy, museums and as many local attractions as we could fit in a day. Daily Mass was included in beautiful side chapels as well as in the basilicas and cathedrals.

A highlight of the trip was the visit to Sant'Angelo, the place of Mother Cabrini's birth and to Codogno, where she started the order of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Sr. Maria Regina Canale, MSC, General Councilor for Europe, in true Cabrinian hospitality, welcomed us with open arms and gave a wonderful tour of the Cabrini Museum, the Center of

Spirituality, the school and Mother Cabrini's home.

Our group was delighted to meet some of the other Missionary Sisters in Sant'Angelo who prepared a lovely reception for our afternoon visit to the school. How special and grace-filled that day was and what a wonderful gift to be able to see where Mother Cabrini's life and ministry began!

The pilgrimage ended in Rome with a tour of the Vatican Museum and a visit to St. Peter's Basilica where we had a surprise meeting with Cardinal Stafford of Denver, who just happened to be there that day. We also were very happy to have the opportunity to meet up with Sr. Bernadette Anello, MSC, General Councilor for the Stella Maris Province, who joined our group as we were touring near the Pantheon, on our walk to the Trevi Fountain and for a special trip to a gelato shop and a lovely dinner later that evening. Our group really appreciated the






