# An Advent Invitation

Advent invites us to prepare ourselves for Christ's coming into our world anew so that we and our world may be touched once again by God's mercy and love and be changed. One way to spend our Advent season might be to consider how we can take small steps to change ourselves and our world by focusing on the words of Pope Francis to the U. S. Congress on September 24, 2015:

"All of us are quite aware of, and deeply worried by, the disturbing social and political situation of the world today. Our world is increasingly a place of violent conflict, hatred and brutal atrocities, committed even in the name of God and of religion.

Our response must be one of hope and healing, of justice and peace. Our efforts must aim at restoring hope, righting wrongs, maintaining commitments, and thus promoting the well-being of individuals and of peoples in a renewed spirit of fraternity and solidarity, cooperating generously for the common good."



So during the four weeks of Advent, let us focus on each of the Pope's themes – hope and healing, justice and peace. Let us reflect on these themes through readings which will inform our actions. In this way, our Advent season will be a rich spiritual experience of preparing to meet Jesus again in our hearts, in others around us, and in the daily events of our lives.

# A MISSIONARY AT HEART

We are pleased to share this story on Sr. Alice Zanon, MSC. This article first appeared in **The Beat**, the news magazine of Cabrini Health in Australia. **This is the third and final** instalment.

From time to time, Sr. Alice returns to Melbourne, Australia, out of her sense of family duty but does not feel she belongs to any particular country – not to Australia (where she was born and remains a citizen), not to Italy (the country of her family's heritage) and not the USA (where she has lived and worked for 20 years). She describes this latter period as the most fulfilling and rewarding in her life's work. "The Cabrini High School family is so strong in its charism," she said. "I feel blessed to have the opportunity to bear witness to the Gospel

values, to live those values, to teach them and to instill them in the hearts of minds of our students. I am happy in my ministry as a religious Sister and to be sharing my gifts in the workplace – it is the best of both worlds." She says they are two vastly different worlds.

Although a teacher, she says the field in which she is involved is secondary to that of helping others to take on and live the charism of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini. "We put people first, rather than labelling them as students or patients, and seek to accompany each other in our journey through life." In doing so, Sr. Alice has touched many thousands of young lives as well as those of their families. As well as her full-time ministry at Cabrini High School, Sr.


Alice is Spiritual Director with the Legion of Mary, a lay Catholic organization present in most countries whereby members give volunteer service to the Church. Also, she is involved with her local parish church, Our Lady of the Rosary. Sr. Alice hosts fortnightly groups of visitors to the Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini Shrine comprising Mother Cabrini's bedroom and the Sacred Heart Chapel, located on the grounds of Cabrini High School. Also, she ministers at frequent weddings and baptisms held in the chapel, where former students return to hold these special celebrations. During the month of August, 2015, Sr. Alice collaborated with WLAE (New Orleans public television) to produce a documentary film on the lives of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini and six other people who left a lasting legacy in New Orleans. This program, Ordinary People, Extraordinary Gifts, won the national 2016 Gabriel Award.



While she loves her life and ministry in New Orleans, Sr. Alice is ready to pack her bags if called by the Province to do so. "I love it here but I am not attached; I cannot afford to be. As a Missionary Sister, I have surrendered my life to Jesus and have taken a vow of obedience. Therefore, I need to be free to go wherever I am needed. I feel at home here today and all I can look at is today. I don't fit in anywhere in particular but it doesn't bother me – I have enjoyed all my missions, as people have welcomed me and I have found fulfilment in all my ministries."



Now 71, Sr. Alice is still going strong. She rises at 4.30 am daily, beginning with a holy hour, followed by Mass at 7 am at her local church. "The Lord equips me to face whatever comes my way during the day," she said. She works out for 20 minutes on the treadmill in her apartment or walks in her beloved City Park. A slim, vital, gentle woman, she loves her ministry, enjoys good health and does not see retirement on her horizon anytime soon. In fact, at the time of the author's meeting, Sr. Alice was preparing to travel to the Mother Cabrini Shrine in Denver, Colorado. In honor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini, the Shrine offers retreat facilities, daily Mass, and is open every day for visitors. Everyone is welcome to make a pilgrimage to the Shrine, which was designated as a pilgrimage site for the 2016 Jubilee Year of Mercy. "Submitted by Christine Elmer"

### The Peaceable Kingdom



From early childhood, the theme of the Peaceable Kingdom has been a favorite of mine. I was intrigued by the symbol of the Lion and the Lamb sitting side by side as a statue in our nativity. I often think of the Lion of Judah as a sign of justice and the Lamb of God as a sign of peace. Here exists the challenge for harmony and balance.

The Responsorial Psalm speaks of Justice and the fullness of Peace. In these very troubled times, globally - when fear and lack of respect for other so strongly exist - we are called to have a voice for

justice that brings us out of complacency - resembling more the Lion of Judah- armed with both missionary passion and zeal. We are simultaneously called to be signs of the fullness of peace that begins in our communities, mission and families that resembles the Lamb of God. Advent brings a message of Hope. In Romans, Paul speaks of harmony with one another so in one voice we may glorify God. The theme of our recent assembly was to widen our tents - we are called to do so in community, mission and family by being bearers of Jesus' love to the world.

In Matthew, John the Baptist's passion and zeal are evident but also is His humility. John

clearly demonstrates this humility when he steps aside and encourages his disciples to follow Jesus. He knew when to step aside so the other could shine. John truly demonstrates following both the Lion of Judah and the Lamb of God - keeping each in balance.

Matthew also challenges us to welcome one another as Christ welcomes us in community, mission and family. So does Mother Cabrini in our charism of hospitality as bearers of His Love to the world. ~ *Dianne McKenna, MSC*
