The workshop was facilitated by Arturo Chávez, Ph.D., President and CEO of the Mexican American Catholic College in San Antonio, Texas. The workshop focused on the following areas: differences in cultural values and orientations; stereotypes and prejudices; perceptions of power; and the dynamics of intercultural communication. The workshop further addressed interculturality in the social context of racism and the Church's call for systematic justice and transformation.

This Lenten season, in what has become a beloved tradition, the Missionary Sisters and some of their lay collaborators will be offering reflections on the Gospels of the Sundays of Lent.

March 19 THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

Ex 17:3-7/Rom 5:1-2, 5-8/Jn 4:5-42 or 4:5-15, 19b-26, 39a, 40-42 (28) Pss III


Scripture often uses the physical world to help us understand spiritual truths. We know that water is an essential element of life. Without water there is no life, and when we are lacking it our bodies scream out with the sensation of thirst. This concept of thirst is a common thread throughout the readings for today. First we see the children of God crying out for water to Moses and God in the desert because of their physical needs. Then, at Jacob's well we find Jesus using the imagery of water to explain his own life-giving nature and ability to quench our spiritual needs. In both instances we find that God provides for his people.

This imagery of water, thirst, and finding our peace in Christ is particularly powerful during the Lenten season as I write during the waning days of a Southern Hemisphere summer in Swaziland. Readers in the Northern Hemisphere often associate the time around Easter as coinciding with spring rains and new life. Here in Swaziland, Easter brings with it cool evenings and respite from scorching days. In both, we see the promise of the resurrection: something new and better and life-giving is coming.

In Swaziland the coming cool months also represent the start of our dry season at a time when the country has already been hit by drought resulting in decimated crops, lost livestock, and water rationing (when it is available at all). It demonstrates how visceral our need for water is because it is essential for life. When Jesus calls himself the living water, he reminds us that our need for spiritual replenishment is just as strong and that he is the ultimate source of life abundant.

As we reflect together during this time, may we not forget the very real physical needs of those around us, nor the spiritual fulfilment Christ promises when he says "the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life."
