Dr. Donald B. Taylor, President of Cabrini University, shared the following message with the campus community this week: "Being the only university in the world named for the Patron Saint of Immigrants, it is important to share with you the excellent statement issued by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Committee on Migration regarding President Trump's recent executive order."

The complete text appears below:

U.S. Bishops Chairman on Migration says New Executive Order Still Leaves Many Innocent Lives at Risk

March 6, 2017

WASHINGTON—The Most Reverend Joe S. Vásquez, Bishop of Austin and Chair of the USCCB Committee on Migration, says that President Trump's latest Executive Order still puts vulnerable populations around the world at risk. In a statement issued after the announcement of today's travel suspension, Bishop Vásquez says that while we seek to maintain our values and safety, we must also exercise compassion in assisting and continuing to welcome the stranger.

Bishop Vázquez's full statement follows:

"We remain deeply troubled by the human consequences of the revised executive order on refugee admissions and the travel ban. While we note the Administration's efforts to modify the Executive Order in light of various legal concerns, the revised Order still leaves many innocent lives at risk.

The removal of one of the original seven predominantly Muslim countries temporarily barred from entering the United States is welcome, but we are disappointed that the revised order maintains the temporary shutdown of the U.S. refugee admissions program, continues the



more than 60 percent reduction in the number of refugees who can be resettled into the United States this year, and still temporarily bars nationals from six predominantly

Muslim countries from entering the United States.

The U.S. Catholic Bishops have long recognized the importance of ensuring public safety and would welcome reasonable and necessary steps to accomplish that goal. However, based on the knowledge that refugees are already subjected to the most



vigorous vetting process of anyone who enters the United States, there is no merit to pausing the refugee resettlement program while considering further improvement to that vetting process.

The United States has long provided leadership in resettling refugees. We believe in assisting all those who are vulnerable and fleeing persecution, regardless of their religion, including Christians, Muslims, and all others. We

believe that by helping to resettle the most vulnerable, we are living out our Christian faith and "welcoming the stranger" as Jesus has challenged us to do.

Today, more than 65 million people around the world are forcibly displaced from their

homes. Given this extraordinary level of suffering, the U.S. Catholic Bishops reaffirm their support for, and efforts to protect, all who flee persecution and violence, as just one part of the perennial and global work of the Church in defense of vulnerable persons. Resettling only 50,000 refugees a year, down from 110,000, does not reflect the need, our compassion, and our capacity as a nation. We have the ability to continue to assist the most vulnerable among us without sacrificing our values as Americans or the safety and security of our nation." ~ with thanks to Dr. Donald Taylor




From the Province Vocation Promotion Team ...

March 12^{th} - SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT - Gn 12:1-4a/2 Tm 1:8b-10/Mt 17:1-9 (25) Pss II

ENLARGING THE PLACE OF OUR TENT: EXPERIENCE OF TRANSFIGURATION

In those days it echoed in the heart of Sr. Pietrina: "Expand the tent of your Province and go to the land that I will show you, now it is the favorable time."

And after a prudent time of prayer and discernment, in the splendor of the cloud I heard the voice of the Father who said: This is my Will and that of my Son, the Beloved; listen to Him ".

And there was Moses, the great deliverer of bondage, who gave hope to the anguished people. And there was Elijah, the great prophet who did not let himself be felt, neither in the strong wind, nor in the earthquake nor in the fire, but in the soft and delicate sound of a deep motion and inspiration: to open a new mission in the City of Denver.

And we could exclaim with all spontaneity: "Here we are well in the Shrine, let us continue in our already established Tent. People come to us and we serve them in some way." But Mother Cabrini seemed to sense the anguish and hopelessness that came upon so many immigrants who needed her style of salvation and liberation. And so, we literally "went down the mountain" after the experience of the Transfiguration, to insert ourselves in a parish of 97% of immigrants, of whom about 70% are undocumented. Immigrants who, in these moments of American history, are afraid to go out, are afraid to speak, are afraid to go to work, are afraid of being deported, leaving their families shattered and broken. Mother Cabrini definitely wanted to celebrate the centenary of her death, being among them as one day she was in the same city of Denver among her Italian brothers and sisters.

Today serving our brothers and sisters from the two missions (the Shrine and St. Cajetan Church), together we exclaim to the loving Heart of Jesus, as our Mother Francesca, Patroness of Immigrants:

"May your mercy, Lord, come upon us as we expect of You."

AMEN.
