

Prayer for Vocations

God our Father, we thank you for calling men and women to serve in your Son's Kingdom as priests, deacons, and consecrated persons. Send your Holy Spirit to help others to respond generously and courageously to your call. May our community of faith support vocations of sacrificial love in our youth and young adults. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever.

The purpose of the World Day of Prayer for Vocations is to publicly celebrate vocations to ordained ministry and religious life in all its forms. Many parishes and religious institutes commemorate this day with prayer for vocations and vocation promotion events.

From the message of Pope Francis:

On this day dedicated to prayer for vocations, I urge all the faithful to assume their responsibility for the care and discernment of vocations.

Vocations are born within the Church

From the moment a vocation begins to become evident, it is necessary to have an adequate "sense" of the Church. No one is called exclusively for a particular region, or for a group or for an ecclesial movement, but rather for the Church and for the world. The community becomes the home and the family where vocations are born. Candidates gratefully contemplate this mediation of the community as an essential element for their future. They learn to know and to love their brothers and sisters who pursue paths different from their own; and these bonds strengthen in everyone the communion which they share.

Vocations grow within the Church

In the course of formation, candidates for various vocations need to grow in their knowledge of the ecclesial community. To that end, it is helpful to undertake *some apostolic experience together with other members of the community*, for example: in the company of a good catechist, to communicate the Christian message; together with a religious community, to experience the evangelization of the peripheries sharing in the life of the cloister, to discover the treasure of contemplation; in contact with missionaries, to know more closely the mission *ad gentes*; and in the company of diocesan priests, to deepen one's experience of pastoral life in the parish and in the diocese. For those who are already in formation, the ecclesial community always remains the fundamental formational environment, towards which one should feel a sense of gratitude.

Vocations are sustained by the Church.

After definitive commitment, our vocational journey within the Church does not come to an end, but it continues in our willingness to serve, our perseverance and our ongoing formation. The one who has consecrated his life to the Lord is willing to serve the Church wherever it has need. Missionaries are accompanied and sustained by the Christian community, which always remains a vital point of reference, just as a visible homeland offers security to all who are on pilgrimage towards eternal life.

We ask the Lord to grant to all those who are on a vocational journey a deep sense of belonging to the Church; and that the Holy Spirit may strengthen among Pastors, and all of the faithful, a deeper sense of communion, discernment and spiritual fatherhood and motherhood.



Successful Lenten Campaign Against Human Trafficking

Informed by his Franciscan Community of an important Lenten advocacy campaign for slave-free seafood, Fr. Edwin Robinson, OFM, Director of Pastoral Care at Cabrini of Westchester, was compelled to raise awareness. He shared the Lenten initiative led by the Coalition of Catholic Organizations Against Human Trafficking (CCOAHT) with Patricia Krasnausky, President and CEO, and, together, they brought the campaign to the Cabrini community.

In honor of the Year of Mercy, Ms. Krasnausky ordered and distributed over 500 hundred pre-paid postcards addressed to two of the largest distributors of seafood: Costco and Starkist. The message on the postcards read: "Catholics want slave-free seafood this year, and will be vigilant about this as we observe Lent. We, therefore, kindly urge you to do all in your power to ensure that your supply chains are free of the taint of forced labor."

Ms. Krasnausky had the postcards signed by many employees of Cabrini of Westchester as well as those in attendance of the Cabrini Day of Prayer, Restoration and Renewal held at Cabrini College. Many were stunned to learn that the United States imports 80-90% of its seafood, and tens of thousands of people are exploited at every link in the seafood harvesting and production chain.



As a result of Cabrini's participation, we received the following feedback from CCOAHT. "Over 15,000 cards were mailed, which exceeded the goals of the campaign. As a

result, the National Fisheries Institute contacted the US Bishops Conference and a meeting is scheduled to occur in May. This contact means that the mail campaign had an effect. The initial meeting is the first step in the effort re: halting the human trafficking situation in shrimp and fish farming."

Therefore, all the individuals who signed and mailed in postcards made a significant contribution to the campaign. Thank you, and God bless one and all!

In addition to making these recipes, our Chef taught us about the importance of cleaning fruits and vegetables, maintaining a clean work area and what the proper temperature should be when cooking certain foods such as beef and chicken. He also taught us about the unique kinds of fruits and vegetables that are grown in Puebla including a variety of green cabbage called "col" with its thick leaves and round shape.

We all watched as our Chef created a delicious salad and very tasty Gazpacho soup. Everyone enjoyed the class especially the finished products! We all received a copy of the recipes so that we can try them at home. We hope that you will also enjoy these delicious recipes! We hope to continue to have our Cooking Class. Mexican Spring Salad

- 2 limes, juiced
- 2 lemons, juiced
- 2 or 3 sweet California oranges, juiced
- 4 cucumbers, peeled and sliced
- 4 avocados, peeled and cubed
- 5-6 tomatoes, quartered
- 2 apples, cubed
- 1 bunch or 2 ounces of cilantro, chopped
- 1 pinch of salt
- 1 pinch of pepper
- 3 teaspoons of olive oil
- Combine veggies and fruits in a bowl. Squeeze lemon, lime
- & orange juice over ingredients. Add salt, pepper,
- cilantro and olive oil and toss together.

Gazpacho

Using the Spring Salad ingredients, add a pinch of crushed pepper and a pinch of chopped garlic. Blend all ingredients together in a blender. When the consistency is smooth, serve cold in a cup or bowl.

Garnish with sour cream or yogurt.

Taking Positive Steps to End Food Scarcity

In a country of wealth and abundance many U.S. citizens are going hungry. The areas in which this scarcity of food occurs are referred to as *food deserts* - typically low-income neighborhoods with few healthy food options; neighborhoods with stores that sell mostly processed foods.

Throughout the years, the number of food deserts in the U.S. has increased. Currently, there are about 24.6 million Americans living in communities with no access to healthy food options, contributing to the over \$50 billion a year that Americans pay [in healthcare costs] because of obesity.

Last Tuesday, Cabrini College held a series of lectures addressing the food scarcity problem. Jeffrey Brown, a Nerney Leadership Institute "Executive in Residence" and the founder, president, and CEO of Brown's Super Stores, Inc. and UpLift Solutions, was a keynote speaker. Brown described his role as an officer and director of Wakefern Food Corporation, which is the marketing and distribution arm for ShopRite grocery stores, as well as, the work he has done assimilating the concerns of community members into the decisions he makes in his companies.

With his belief that "helping is more potent than money," he proceeded to ask himself, "how can [his companies] make a profit and still help people?" Brown believes that helping people while making a profit is how business

should operate rather than having a for profit only mentality. This was the catalyst to reach out to lower-income communities in North Philadelphia to get first hand answers as to what people actually needed. After listening to all of their concerns, he made it his mission to provide services and [healthy] products with low-income communities in mind.



Now, when customers enters a ShopRite, they are met with more than just fresh produce, they also have the opportunity to speak with a nutritionist who can offer healthy food alternatives while honoring their budgets and culture. One such example would be providing "halal"

foods* - foods that comply with shari'a**. Selling locally grown produce from small entrepreneurs in the area is another way Brown ensures that the community and its

people are central to the company's business strategies and decisions.

During one point in the lecture, the question of what can students and young adults do was posed. In response, Brown and his colleague, Atif Bostic, stated young people should think

untraditionally in order to prove that there are other ways to carry out plans. Taking initiative is the way to go – because without it, the chances of [lasting] success are limited.

On Monday, April 11, Fort Tryon Jewish Center honored the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart at a springtime gala to thank them for their hospitality. Rabbi Guy Austrian recalled first meeting Sr. Tommasina Lanski, MSC, who was then Shrine Director. "It was

Purim, and I was dressed in a silly costume to entertain the children, when I ran into Sister Tommasina. It was an embarrassing first impression. Sister told me not to worry; "Sometimes people laugh at the way I dress, too!"

Rabbi Austrian presented the Shrine with a beautiful framed papercut image of the Hamsa, or Hand of God symbol. The artwork was created by a member of their congregation, and depicts a symbol of protection common to both Judaism and Christianity.

Gazing at the assembled guests, Sr. Tommasina said, "How did we get to this place, where a Jewish community and Catholic community gather in

gratitude? This was a gift from God that united the two out of a respect for faith. As we got to know each other we had a greater respect for each other's faith and greater love for our own. We share a love for and gratitude to the same God."



On the Shrine grounds last September, families from the Jewish Center gathered to begin their celebration of Sukkot in the shadow of trees planted when Mother Cabrini was alive. Laughing children dashed beneath a full moon as their parents watched from the Sukkoh hut that was decorated with symbols of the harvest festival. From the darkness a voice began a song in Hebrew and was joined softly by others.

Both communities will continue to be reminder of the common ground among people who love God and their neighbors. Each fall, the Sukkoh hut will rise under the Cabrini trees to welcome all.
