Cabrini University Launches Center on Immigration

On Thursday, April 27, President Donald Taylor and Provost Jeffrey Gingerich welcomed approximately 150 guests to the Cabrini University Mansion to celebrate the creation of the Center on Immigration. Inspired by the legacy of Mother Cabrini, the Patroness of Immigrants, and led by

Consistent with the mission of Cabrini University and the legacy of St. Frances X. Cabrini, Patroness of Immigrant, the Center engages students and scholars in the pursuit of social justice to advance the human rights and human dignity of people in migration. It does so by engaging nationally and globally in three interrelated areas of focus: Education and Advocacy; Research and Scholarship; and Culture and History.

Abel Rodríguez, Center Director and Assistant Professor of Religion, Law and Social Justice, the Center will be a global leader promoting immigrant rights through advocacy, scholarship, and advancement of cultural expression.

The celebration opened with an invocation to Mother Cabrini given by Sister Christine Marie Baltas, MSC, and a reflection by Fabrine De Oliveira, a Cabrini student and a native of Brazil who shared her own immigrant experience.

Luz Colón, Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Governor's Advisory Commission on Latino Affairs, presented a proclamation in which PA Governor Tom Wolf acknowledged the Center's planned contributions to the immigrant community. A panel discussion took place featuring Sr. Yolanda Flores, MSC, Family Program Coordinator at Cabrini Immigrant Services - NYC; Hernán Guaracao, Publisher & CEO of AL DÍA News Media and Cabrini University Trustee; Erika Almirón, Executive Director of Juntos; John Grogan, Esq., Founding Partner at Langer, Grogan and Diver PC; and Steven Larín, Esq. Senior Director of Legal Services & Immigration policy at Nationalities Service Center.





Mr. Rodríguez shared his vision for the Center, and the panel members addressed the needs and concerns of immigrants and their families and critiqued current immigration policies, which have expanded the detention and deportation of immigrants and created extensive fear and distress in immigrant communities.

Mark Kiselica, Ph.D. Dean of the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, paid tribute to the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the employees and volunteers of Cabrini Immigrant Services for their heroic work on behalf of immigrants and their families.

The celebration concluded with a special presentation by Sr. Christine Marie Baltas, who gave Mr. Rodríguez a framed Seal of the Institute of the MSCs on behalf of Sr. Pietrina Raccuglia, Provincial, and all MSCs as an expression of the Sisters' support for the future work of the Center.

Mother Cabrini and Horizons of Hope – A Cabrini Pilgrimage Experience

The Pilgrimage began on Saturday, April 22 at the beautiful Mother Cabrini Shrine in Golden, CO. We began by discussing the notion of pilgrimage - the style and content of this formative experience with its different aspects of reflection, conversation, journaling and prayer led by Mark Davis (Mark is an experienced consultant, facilitator and trainer. Central to his work is the creation of interpersonal environments where graceful conversation may take place.)

The Stone House

Each day, we attended Mass, shared morning and evening prayer, readings, reflections and grace-filled conversations.

A different theme started each of our days with topics of: Beginnings, Good Christians and Good Citizens, Extravagant Dreams, Primacy of Love in the Cabrini story, the Italian Diaspora within Colorado & the miners and their families, Education as Liberation, the Experience of Immigrants Today and the Continued Relevance of Traditio.

Our Conversations were around topics *–Learning to Love, Hearing Distant Voices, Extravagant Dreams, Life Long Becoming and Courage at the Crossroads.* We had Input Sessions where Sr. Bernadette Casciano, MSC spoke on local history and the importance of mining She told us how the Sisters visited the miners who were scattered in camps throughout the state and went deep into the mines to minister to the needs of those working there. Following that session, we had an 'experience of place' and toured the local Phoenix Mines. The owner of the mine, Al Mosch, led our group through his mine and he was so excited we were there, because he led a similar tour 22 years ago for Missionary Sisters who were visiting the U.S. from Italy! **The pictures and captions below were in the Clear Creek Courant newspaper dated August 9, 1995:**

Jeannie Salonya, is a volunteer at the Shrine and was raised by the MSCs at the Queen of Heaven Orphanage, which Mother Cabrini founded in Denver, Colorado. Mother Cabrini brought the Shrine property and built the 'Stone House' at the Shrine, which was used as a summer camp for the girls from the orphanage. Jeannie shared her experiences of being raised by the MSCs , her love for them and for the Shrine. We then had a guided tour of the Stone House, led by Tommy Francis, whose father drove the carts filled with the orphans up to the Shrine in the summer months while Tommy was a 5 year old boy living on the site. What amazing, incredibly moving stories, of which we will never forget!

Sr. Bernadette gave a wonderful, informative presentation on the history of the Sisters in Denver relating how Mother Cabrini received two urgent appeals from Bishop Matz and Father Mariano Lepore, pastor of the Italian parish of Mount Carmel to minister to the Italian immigrants who were employed in the backbreaking and dangerous work of the mining and railroad industries. Since the parish had no school, in 1902 Cabrini rented a two-story house from Michael Notary (a wealthy merchant in the area) and started a school. On the first day of opening, two hundred children hurried to enroll. As another "experience of place", we had the privilege of having a private tour of the Mount Carmel parish and visited the Michael Notary House.

We learned of the Women's Gold Tapestry, which is a hand-stitched, $9 \ge 12$ foot long beautiful piece of art that took 4,500 hours and two years of intensive effort to complete. It pays homage to the courage, perseverance, and sacrifices women made to help settle and civilize Colorado. One of the women on the tapestry is Mother Cabrini (of

course)! We took a trip to the state capitol building, where the tapestry is housed. While there, a large tour was taking place. They found out who we were and the

tour guide asked Sr. Bernadette to speak about the history of Mother Cabrini in Denver and the Shrine. It was amazing and everyone was in awe of Sr. Bernadette!

[**D**uring the Pilgrimage] we also shared beautiful readings from Mother Cabrini, the MSC Constitutions, Sr. Maria Barbagallo, MSC, Sr. Mary Lou Sullivan, MSC and others such as Albert Schweitzer, Margaret Wheatley, Henri Nouwen, John O'Donohue, Jean Vanier, all accompanied with beautiful images.

What a blessed experience this event turned out to be! Our next Pilgrimage is being planned to take place in 2018 in Chicago. I pray you have the opportunity to join us! ~ *submitted by Karol Brewer*

participating in Sacred Sites Open house

This year marks the Landmarks Conservancy's seventh annual *Sacred Sites* Open House on **May 20**th **and 21**st.



This year's theme, *Stained Glass: Windows on this World and the Next* focuses on the significance and conservation of stained glass and windows in religious sites and highlights work of American stained glass masters including John LaFarge, Henry Sharp, and Louis Comfort Tiffany as well as prominent European artists and studios including Henry Holiday and Mayer of Munich among others.

Over 130 churches, synagogues, and meetinghouses throughout the city and state will be open for you to explore their wonderful religious architecture.

The St. Frances X. Cabrini Shrine will be open both Saturday and Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., with a gift shop and both guided and self-guided tours.

Stained glass in the chapel depicts the life of Jesus and a 3-story image of Mother Cabrini. They have painted realistic detail and dynamic shape. They were designed by Fabian Zaccone in New

York and fabricated by G. Pollini in Florence, Italy, installed in 1959.

The pictorial mosaic that surrounds the altar, depicting Mother Cabrini's life and work, is outstanding in its artisanship and message. This mosaic, recently restored by Stephen Miotto of Miotto Mosaic Art Studios, is priceless and irreplaceable. It is 123 feet long and 24 feet high, and is a unique undertaking for its time, or any time. It is an architectural and spiritual treasure.

The Shrine of St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was designed by architects De Sina & Pellegrino. Frances Xavier Cabrini, the first American citizen to be made a saint, was the founder of the Missionary



Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, was sent to New York in 1880 to assist Italian immigrants. She established schools, hospitals, and orphanages around the country. With a commitment to immigrants of all kinds, her ministry extended across the country and into South America. Mother Cabrini died in Chicago in 1917. Her remains were returned to Washington Heights, site of the Mother Cabrini High School, and enshrined. She was canonized in 1946.

Cabrini University Marches in P. C. for Immigrants

On Monday, May 1, Cabrini students and staff took time away from preparing for finals to make their way to the nation's capital for a march and rally in solidarity with workers and immigrants. Earlier in the semester students had made protest signs with

slogans such as "No Human Is Illegal," and "Fight Ignorance, Not Immigrants," and these signs were hung on a barricade constructed on the University Commons for a Border Solidarity Mass celebrated on April 19 to commemorate Pope Francis's visit to the US-Mexico border the year prior.



Cabrini students took those signs and joined thousands of other protesters in DuPont Circle to protest anti-immigrant sentiments and policies, representing the namesake of the Patron Saint of Immigrants. Chants worked their way through the crowds, alternating between English and Spanish: "No hate, no fear, immigrants are welcome here!" "*¡El pueblo unido jamás será vencido!*" We arrived at Lafayette Square, named for an immigrant hero of the Revolution - America's favorite fighting Frenchman and cheered facing the White House for the hope that we can be better together.

Walking back to the van we passed through the MLK Memorial, with tired legs and hoarse voices, reading his words: "Out of a mountain of despair, a stone of hope." And "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. 
From the big smiles on the children's faces it was apparent that a good time was had by all.
