Will Pope Francis Inspire a Bounce in Vocations?

"A miracle of humility in an age of vanity" is singer-songwriter Elton John's description of Pope Francis. Andrew O'Connell, Communications Director for the Presentation Brothers in Ireland, shares that Elton John's description of Pope Francis, remains in O'Connell's book, as the most succinct and perceptive explanation for our Argentine's pope's massive, global popularity. O'Connell writing in HORIZON journal of the NRVC goes on to wonder what this hugely popular pope will mean for vocations. Three factors may influence the answer:

Identity Issues

The NRVC's landmark 2009 survey of new and recent vocations confirmed that many young adults seek out "firm markers" of identity when searching for a religious congregation. Many discerners appear to be particularly comfortable with a distinctly Catholic culture which contrasts with the secular nature of postmodern society. Pope Benedict and Pope St. John Paul encouraged young Catholics to see themselves as countercultural witnesses. Pope Francis has called upon Catholics to focus on



mercy and the essentials of the faith. Pope Francis, just like his predecessors, has also encouraged young adults to "swim against the tide," and to "rebel against this culture that sees everything as temporary." Could Pope Francis, then, encourage a new and vibrant source of vocations who will find a home in the church's many congregations concerned with the poor and social justice?

Image of Religious Life

Pope Francis, a former Jesuit provincial, knows religious life inside and out. [In speaking to religious, he places great] importance on the role of joyful religious witness in the life of the church.



In addition, this pope is not impressed with excessive traditionalism or liberalism in religious life. Pope Francis is calling religious life to Christocentricity and away from extremes.

Expectation management

Pope Francis, based largely on media reporting, is feeding an expectation of change in church teaching on several issues. Could young discerners postpone the decision to follow a religious vocation in the expectation that the Church might look very different in five or ten years time?

While some are celebrating this papacy as the long-awaited sequel to "the Spirit of Vatican II," the key challenge for vocation directors, and indeed all, to watch how young people respond to Pope Francis' message in the cultural context of our day and accompany them accordingly.

Pope Francis is amplifying the Ignation and Franciscan charisms of the church. It will be intriguing to see how our young people respond.

Mother Cabrini Shrine



MOTHER CABRINI SHRINE

In 1902, Mother Cabrini came to Colorado at the invitation of Bishop Matz to open a school in north Denver. In 1905 the Queen of Heaven Orphanage opened its doors to girls aged two to fifteen. In 1909 Mother Cabrini purchased some land in Mount Vernon Canyon to establish a summer camp for the girls at the orphanage. She acquired the site at a very reasonable price because it did not have a good source of water. When Mother Cabrini accompanied her Missionary Sisters and the orphan girls to the summer camp, Mother Cabrini pointed her cane to a rock and asked one of the Sisters to lift it. The spring of water was discovered. On that same visit they hiked to the summit for a picnic lunch and viewed with delight the majestic, snowtopped mountain peaks piercing the clear, blue sky. Mother Cabrini then sent the Sisters and girls to gather white rocks which they arranged on the ground in the form of a heart surrounded by a cross and crown of thorns. "The heart is a symbol of the great love Jesus has for each of you," Mother Cabrini told them. On July 7, 1946, Frances Cabrini was declared a saint. The summer camp became Mother Cabrini Shrine, a place of prayer and pilgrimage in honor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and St. Frances Xavier Cabrini.

Today, the Shrine continues to provide spiritual nourishment to thousands of pilgrims and visitors who come to seek the peace and tranquility found on this holy ground. Daily Mass is offered as well as opportunities for quiet reflection and prayer, recitation of the rosary and the stations of the cross. Retreat facilities are available to parish staffs, youth groups and senior citizens among many others.

Mother Cabrini Shrine is self-supporting and does not have outside sources of revenue. Donations, gift shop sales, our annual gala and other fundraising programs account for the Shrine's income. The funds raised at this year's gala will be used for operations and on-going capital improvements. We are so grateful for your support and with your help we will continue to impart the great legacy of St. Frances Cabrini to future generations at Mother Cabrini Shrine.
