The Call of Cabrini – St. Frances X. Cabrini Shrine, NYC



Pilgrims from many different nations have visited the St. Frances X. Cabrini Shrine in New York

City during this Jubilee Year of Mercy.

What has brought a hundred people from Costa Rica, sixty people from Peru, seventy-five more from nations in West Africa, and five hundred fifty local residents to venture to West 190th Street in NYC?

They have all come to visit a church built in honor of a Catholic Sister from Italy as part of a

pilgrimage during the "Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy" or the "Year of Mercy."

Announced in March 2015 by Pope Francis, the occasion is a period of prayer celebrated by Roman Catholics that began in December 2015 and will last until November 2016.

The focus is on God's forgiveness and mercy, and Church leaders observe a time of universal pardon and remission of sins.

Devout observers travel to sites around the world to gather, sing, meditate, and pray.

One of those destinations is the unique mid-century modern chapel on Fort Washington Avenue in Washington Heights. The Saint Frances Cabrini Shrine is just outside the entrance of Fort Tryon Park. It is named for the formidable Saint Frances Cabrini, Patron Saint of Immigrants.

She is also commonly referred to as the "Little Sister."

The shrine is one of only three specially designated pilgrim sites in New York City where the devout may visit to receive special grace and inspiration.

Many arriving pilgrims are drawn by the presence of the Holy Doors, which were blessed last November by Bishop Gerald Walsh, who serves as vicar general of Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New York. The visitors pause outside the doors to gather their thoughts.

Some enter the chapel on their knees, some holding hands with loved ones, some singing; but most walk through the doors in mindful quiet.

It was in 1899 the Mother Cabrini discovered the property where the Shrine now stands. At that time, the neighborhood was a remote northwest edge of New York City. The only buildings in this very rural area of Manhattan were the villas of the wealthy. She purchased the property at 190th Street and Fort Washington Avenue, and opened Sacred Heart Villa to create a "residential school for young ladies."

The Shrine will be celebrating Mother Cabrini's birthday on July 23 with a family friendly day of special Masses, food and refreshments, and outdoor activities. ~ submitted by Cherie Sprosty

Help Fight Human Trafficking with a Smartphone

Human traffickers often advertise children for sex by posting explicit photos usually taken in hotel rooms. Law enforcement can easily find these photos on the Internet, but the challenge is finding out where these photos were taken—that's where **you** can help. Sometimes it takes a village to save a child—the <u>Traffickcam app</u> is creating a virtual network intended to save children from sex trafficking. The TraffickCam app, which is available for



iOS and Android, isn't going to solve the problem, but it's one more tool that could help. The concept is simple. A hotel guest takes photos of the room from as many as four different angles and uploads them through an app. The photos, tagged with their specific location, are then added to a massive database of rooms that law enforcement can compare against photos they find on the internet of children, often bought and sold in hotel rooms from high-end to budget motels.

Developed by researchers at Washington University in conjunction with the Exchange Initiative, a nonprofit working on solutions for ending sex trafficking, the TraffickCam app aims to help police narrow down a list of possible locations where the trafficker took the photo of a child being sold for sex. Then, the police can upload that photo to the app and compare it against the photos uploaded by the traveling public.

The app launched June 20 and already has been downloaded more than 56,000 times. They estimate it's getting around 1,700 new photos a day from hotel-goers.

From the Province Vocation Promotion Team...

This week, we bring you the concluding excerpts of "Vocations on the Precipice" by Sr. Amy Hereford, CSJ which appeared in the HORIZON Journal of the NRVC.

New members as co-creators

In vocation ministry today, we are not inviting men and women who look like us and think like us to become like us in community. Instead we are reaching out to men and women who are significantly different from us in age, ethnicity, culture, experience, and education. We are inviting them to a space to nurture their vocations and to become co-creators of the next phase

of our common story.

Yes, we can and should share our experience of charism, community, spirituality, and mission. But we also have to afford them the space to integrate this experience, and to re-imagine it in terms of their own 21st century sensibilities.



Keep the faith

Vocation ministry today can be a lonely road. We look at our communities and ask if we can realistically invite women and men to join us. If we have someone interested, we may have a very short list of persons and communities to introduce them to as they get to know the community. Our brothers and sisters, or even we ourselves, may value our ministry in terms of how many have entered, or how many have stayed. We expend our time, our energy, our hopes and our dreams, without the results we might have hoped for. It is important to seek out the support we need in this moment and to keep our hope alive in this challenging ministry.

Form a critical mass

It has become common to say that everyone in the community is a promoter of vocations. The old saying though, may ring true: if it is everyone's job, it is no one's job. It is important to have a critical mass of individuals who have the time, energy, focus and resources to dedicate to this ministry. In my own community, we recently held a series of discernment days for those interested in vocation and formation ministry. Most of the youngest sisters in the province stepped forward for this ministry, and the community entrusted it to us. This experience has already born fruit in affording us the opportunity to work together and to build cohesion in our group. Our team has given us its blessing and has affirmed our efforts.

We are committed to working together to live our lives authentically, to share our joy and hope with interested women, and to open our homes and our hearts to those who wish to join us.

Our team is surrounded by a support team of our elder sisters who have committed to be with us in this ministry, to share their time, their passion for religious life and their experience. Leadership and the wider community has given us its blessing and affirmed our efforts. Memorial for Andrea Baumann

If I wrote a history of Cabrini Immigrant Services since its inception in the Village of Dobbs Ferry about 17 years ago, the story of Andrea Baumann would be in the first chapter with the headline: "New Tutor Volunteers at Cabrini, with a Touch of Class". This was Andrea. This is how it all happened.

On a windy March day about 10 years ago Andrea entered Cabrini's office, then on Cedar Street, looking for some volunteer work to do. She was quite clear about her intent. The work had to be meaningful and she wanted to work with younger adults. Andrea had no intention of simply sitting around. She was no couch potato! Tutoring immigrants in English had an appeal for her and so her tutoring career began. Through the years Andrea

worked with students from various countries, but one student stands out in my mind, Julia.



Julia was from China, married with one little girl. They lived on Cedar Street right across from the office and in an apartment above what is now Fiamore. Julia and Andrea working together was a match made in heaven. Together, they worked each week. Julia always on time for the lesson, Andrea ready to teach, elegantly coiffed...a touch of class. Verbs and pronouns were not the only lessons taught by Andrea. She loved to talk about the importance of good manners, dressing appropriately and our good old American customs and traditions.

Andrea loved good literature! Author Vladimir Nabukov was no stranger to Andrea's lessons. Neither were children's authors like Japanese American Allen Say and the American

favorite E.B. White. Sometimes I looked in as these lessons were going on. Andrea and Julia would take turns reading aloud to one another, talking about vocabulary and engaging in follow-up dialogue. It was like watching a well-choreographed dance. Andrea loved talking politics too. Can you just imagine her now?

Whatever happened to Julia? Where does the story end? She learned English well and eventually got a degree in mathematics from a prestigious New York university. She's become a citizen and bought a house in New Jersey. Hers is a true success story. For more than 10 years Cabrini was graced by Andrea's presence, her European old world charm, intelligence, with and wisdom...her generosity. She was a member of our Cabrini family at fundraisers, picnics in Waterfront Park, Christmas parties and citizenship celebrations. Andrea did it all with class.

We thank Andrea. She will forever be remembered in our minds and hearts.




