## Immigration Advocates Praise Supreme Court Decision Preserving DACA

Catholic leaders praised the Supreme Court on Thursday, June 18 following its decision to protect undocumented immigrants who arrived in the United States as children from deportation. The 5-4 decision was a blow to the current administration, which has advocated to end Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA).

Trump administration could still end the program.

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops supported the court's decision in favor of hundreds of thousands of "Dreamers," as DACA recipients are known. "First, to DACA youth, through today's decision and beyond we will continue to accompany you and your families. You are a vital part of our church and our community of faith. We are with you," they said in a statement.

Ashley Feasley, director of migration policy and public affairs at the USCCB, said the decision was a "very welcome surprise." But added that the

"Now is the moment to pursue meaningful legislation," she told America. "The Senate really needs to act on this issue. We don't want to get back into another court battle."

Ms. Feasley noted that many Dreamers are college graduates and contribute to a number of service industries. With respect to the pandemic, she pointed out that more than 62,000 Dreamers work in the healthcare industry and more than 70,000 work in food distribution.

Dylan Corbett, the Executive Director of the Hope Border Institute, called the president's various attempts to repeal DACA "arbitrary and capricious," adding that the court's ruling is reason for encouragement.

"This victory belongs to the countless Dreamers who refused to be silenced and forced into the shadows. We still need Congress to act. Pass the Dream Act, cut funding to ICE, tear down walls, set free the detained and restore asylum. The fate of our families and friends is not a question of politics but the work of justice. And this is

holy work, moral work," he wrote.

The Association of Catholic Colleges and Universities (ACCU) have historically defended undocumented students, reiterated its support of that community. "We pray that the decision means that they will be able to continue their studies without interruption and that others in their situation will be encouraged to pursue their educational goals. Women religious working "on the front lines," exposed to the coronavirus yet continuing to care for abandoned children, working to alleviate poverty, providing healthcare and helping victims of human trafficking are not "super women," said Comboni Sister Alicia Vacas.

Instead they are women with great faith, compassion, generosity and determination, she said, "but also very vulnerable women, sometimes exhausted, and most of the time powerless because they are burdened with the brokenness of their people."

On June 17th Cabrini World in collaboration with the National Shrine of St. Frances Xavier Cabrini in Chicago and the Cabrini Retreat Center in Des Plaines, IL hosted a Zoom webinar live from Rome, Italy with Sister Bernadette Anello, MSC, General Councilor. In this first of a Cabrini series of webinars, Sister Bernadette spoke about the Missionary Sisters response to COVID-19. She described how 2020 makes us think of perfect vision yet this year invites us to correct our faulty vision. This pandemic propels us to a new phase of living and in this time of isolation, she asked, who are the people among us that we can call the "Saints Next Door?"

Sr. Bernadette conveyed Pope Francis's message that as missionary disciples we are to become a field hospital of service to all humanity, and she shared examples of the Cabrini World Saints Next Door.

As we prepared for the Feast of the Sacred Heart on June 19, Sister Bernadette reminded us of Mother Cabrini's travels to Buenos Aires in 1895 over rough seas and her words of encouragement to the Missionary Sisters, "When we are faithful to our promises, the heart of Jesus guides us along paths of justice and holiness. 




# Caring Hearts and Hands

years of service to the University.
Father Janicki will take over as
Parochial
Administrator for
Saint Genevieve
Parish in

Flourtown, PA, on July 8, a role to which he was appointed by Philadelphia Archbishop Nelson Pérez.

"Cabrini University and its foundational *Education of the Heart* are stronger today because of Father Carl and his dedication to student engagement, student empowerment, student ownership, and student leadership," said Cabrini President, Donald B. Taylor, PhD. "Father Carl has been an essential champion of Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini's founding vision for the institution. We pray for continued success and good fortune in the next chapter of his journey."

Since 2009, Father Janicki served as the sole priest on campus, providing daily spiritual guidance to students, faculty, and staff at Cabrini's Bruckmann Memorial Chapel of Saint Joseph. He has also created and overseen a range of liturgical programming and service retreats designed to engage students of all faiths and backgrounds.

Father Janicki's relationships with neighboring archdioceses connected Cabrini students with many global opportunities during his tenure, including international pilgrimages to Krakow, Poland, and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, for World Youth Day. During Pope Francis's visit to Philadelphia in 2015, Father Carl coordinated Cabrini's participation in the World Meeting of Families, ensuring students served in various volunteer positions for the occasion.

"I came to Cabrini with an open mind and open heart," Father Janicki said in a statement. "I leave Cabrini with my heart and mind filled by your goodness and blessing which will continue to enrich my life and the lives of those I serve. I am grateful for the time we spent together and for the service we rendered to those most in need locally, nationally, and globally."

An event honoring Father Janicki will be held when it is safe to do so in accordance with COVID-19 safety guidelines. The University will announce more details on the appointment of its next Director of Campus Ministry and Chaplain later this summer.

### From the Province Vocations Promotion Team...

Over the past month we have brought you insights from the National Religious Vocations Conference (NRVC) 2020 Study of Recent Vocations to Religious Life. As a follow up to that study, this week, we continue with the series written by Carol Schuck Scheiber, the editor of HORIZON, the journal of the NRVC on best practices for new membership.

## Best Practices for Encouraging New Membership

#### 4. Continuously build relationships

There are no fail-proof techniques for building relationships with your target demographic. The 2009 and 2020 studies both point out that newer members entered communities where they built a relationship with at least one member...and that led them to the next step, and the next step. Vocation ministers and members of their religious communities reached out, stayed connected, kept inviting, and used many means for doing these things: social media, print and online advertising and promotion, special events, email, blogs, campus retreats and others means.



Over its 32 years as an organization, the National Religious Vocations Conference has been key to another type of relationship-building that matters: collaborative relationships among vocation and formation ministers from different communities. Through cooperation, groups of ministers are able to do what they cannot do alone: sponsor intercommunity retreats, nun runs, high school and campus vocation fairs, and many other types of group projects that help people to learn about religious life.

#### 5. Address internal issues

If a religious community is experiencing serious deficits in any major area (e.g. quality of communal life, clear identity) those problems will naturally inhibit people from joining. The 2009 and 2020

vocation studies both point out that new members are attracted to communities where they can grow in their relationship to God, be part of a joyful community with a genuine communal life, and minister to the people of God. Many communities have taken positive steps to enhance the quality of their communal life. New members are attracted to authentic, healthy communities, meaning that institutes that are serious about inviting in the next generation must be attentive to internal concerns.
