Pope Francis expresses concern about 'disturbing social unrest' in the US

Pope Francis expressed concern on June 3 about what he termed the "disturbing social unrest" taking place throughout the United States. The pontiff called for the confrontation of racism, but said violence is "self-destructive and self-defeating."

In his weekly live-streamed general audience, the Pope directly addressed his "dear brothers and sisters" in the U.S.

Francis says he is following "with great concern the disturbing social unrest in your nation in these past days, following the tragic death of Mr. George Floyd," a 46-year-old African American father who was killed by a Minneapolis police officer on May 25.

"My friends, we cannot tolerate or turn a blind eye to racism and exclusion in



any form and yet claim to defend the sacredness of every human life," said the pontiff. "Nothing is gained by violence and so much is lost" quoting Archbishop José Gomez of the USCCB.

Pope Francis, like his predecessors, including Sts. Paul VI and John Paul II, has always advocated nonviolence. Indeed, he has <u>often cited Martin Luther King Jr.</u> in this regard, including during his address to the U.S. Congress on September 24, 2015, when he recalled the peaceful march Dr. King led from Selma to Montgomery.

In the last part of his message, Pope Francis said, "Today I join the Church in Saint Paul and Minneapolis, and in the entire United States, in praying for the repose of the soul of George Floyd and of all those others who have lost their lives as a result of the sin of racism." His inclusion of the many "who have lost their lives as a result of the sin of racism" is highly significant, especially at the present moment but also in the light of the history of racism in the United States. Given the unprecedented events of COVID-19 and the riots now rampant, it seems for some government officials, immigration issues may have taken a back seat to all else that is transpiring in our country.

What are some of the issues for immigrants that still urgently need our attention?

- COVID 19 Relief for immigrants
 who pay taxes,
 those with Social Security numbers,
 mixed status families
- Path to citizenship for DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) and TPS (Temporary Protected Status) recipients
- Reinstatement of asylum norms
- Access to counsel for detained immigrants and those forced to wait in Mexico
- Raising the number of refugees admitted to the United States (now lower than ever)
- Comprehensive Immigration Reform
- All the issues around our currently closed borders



These are the critical immigration issues needing to be addressed and each of them could be a story in itself. The lives of so many individuals and families are hanging by a thread with the prospect of separation and deportation looming heavily upon them.

Most likely, if you are reading this, you know personally, or are at least are aware of immigrants whose lives are affected by all the legislation (or lack thereof) being enacted today. Politics aside, the welcome, generosity and outreach which are the foundations of our country cannot be put aside. All the more, the foundations of our very Christian faith call us to love, respect and assist those most vulnerable among us.

So, how am I called to answer Jesus' command of love of neighbor? How do I learn more about how I can help? And how do I then respond...not to ISSUES but to PEOPLE IN NEED?
