Dr. Donald Taylor Resigns as Cabrini University President

At Friday's winter Board Plenary, I informed the Trustees that I am resigning as President of Cabrini University, effective at the end of the current academic year. This summer I will start my presidency at the University of Detroit Mercy. It has been a tremendous honor and privilege to serve as the eighth president of Cabrini University, since taking office in July 2014.

During my presidency, I have been blessed to have tremendous support from the Board of Trustees and the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. I especially want to acknowledge my sincere appreciation to Board Chairs Tom Nerney '77, HON'15, John Schanz, HON'18, Frank Emmerich, '92, HON'21, and Amy Lambert. Thanks again for our partnership in leading the University. Your guidance, support and mentorship has meant a great deal to me.

A special thanks to Sisters Christine Marie Baltas and Grace Waters who have blessed our campus with their daily example of what an Education of the Heart means.

Servant leadership of a university requires collaboration, and I would like to thank every Cabinet member I've had the pleasure of working alongside during my time at Cabrini.

I've been blessed to have the best staff in the Office of the President. Thanks for all you do on a daily basis. I would also like to thank the faculty, staff, coaches, alumni, donors, and friends of the University for your support and all you do for our students.

Finally, a huge shout out to Cabrini's amazing students. My wife Lechia and I have been blessed to know you, and we hope you learned as much from us as we learned from you these past eight years.

A transition plan is underway, and details will be announced by Amy Lambert, Board Chair, as soon as they are available. In addition, there will be an opportunity to say goodbye at a farewell event this spring. Details of which will be shared in a future communication.

Also at Friday's Board meeting, Trustees endorsed the Mission 2027 Strategic Plan thereby ensuring that Cabrini is in a strong position with programs and plans to continue to build on its strengths and successes. I will leave Cabrini knowing that the future is bright for the University.

Supreme Court to Hear Arguments on 'Remain in Mexico' Policy

WASHINGTON (CNS) — The justices on the country's highest court have agreed to hear a case that could decide the fate of a Trump-era immigration policy that Biden administration officials have been trying to end. On February 18, the U.S. Supreme Court said it would hear arguments on whether the Biden administration can put an end to the Migrant Protection Protocols, or MPP, a policy that demands asylum-seekers to the U.S. to stay in Mexico until their cases can be heard in the U.S. immigration courts.

The policy has been a headache for the administration as President Joe Biden promised to end it, but, it proved much more difficult to do so once he took office. As soon as he became president in January 2021, Biden paused the policy, he formally sought to end it a few months later in June. But in August of that year, a judge with the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas told administration officials that they had to continue complying with the policy, saying they had not ended it properly.

The Supreme Court refused a Biden administration request to block that District Court ruling while the government pursued an appeal with the New Orleans-based 5th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals. In December, the appeals court upheld the lower court ruling.



Subsequent attempts at ending the policy have failed and it looks as if the high court will be the ultimate arbiter when it hears oral arguments of the case Biden v. Texas, in April.

Immigration supporters, including many Catholic organizations, have railed against the Biden administration for not keeping its word on ending the policy, also called "Remain in Mexico."

In December, just before Biden administration officials restarted the program, a large group of women religious and their supporters demonstrated outside the White House, shouting just a few feet away from the president's residence to end the policy.

MPP was put in place in earnest in 2019 under the Trump administration. Opponents of the policy say migrants have been put in danger or killed by being forced to stay in dangerous border towns, as well as in unsafe living conditions as they wait for hearing. Biden administration officials said they had made some improvements to MPP, but many advocates for immigrants weren't convinced.

The head of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' migration committee, Auxiliary Bishop Mario Dorsonville of Washington, said in December that the better way forward was to end it altogether.

The justices could hand down a decision sometime in June or July before summer recess.


Ash Wednesday
