Ukraine – a Hunting Ground for Traffickers

Human trafficking occurs in every country in the world and the war in Ukraine is not just a battleground - it is a hunting ground for human traffickers. The uprooting of many people and the creation of refugees make a war zone ideal for recruitment into slavery.

According to Michael O'Neill, former Chair of the International NGO Safety and Security Association, "The predators are well-organized, well-resourced, and relentless." Defeating the traffickers, or at least slowing them down, depends on **educating** the refugees. Too often refugees have no idea of the dangers they face from traffickers while at the same time being exceptionally vulnerable to them.



Here's what too often happens: A young woman fleeing Ukraine may be weighed down with multiple fears, including that she: Doesn't have a place to stay; doesn't speak the language; is afraid for her husband's life; is separated from her family and what was once her support system; has lost all her material possessions. Additionally, she's exhausted from a 22-hour trip. She is now the perfect target for a seemingly kindly stranger who offers her a hot meal

and a place to stay. Unfortunately, that "kindly" stranger may whisk her away to another country where she may disappear forever into the sex trade.

Also, members of trafficking rings target relief organizations. They know that if they manage to be accepted as a volunteer, they'll have inside information on who is vulnerable and how to get to them.

Sex trafficking is not a new phenomenon in Ukraine, a country long-known as a hub for transnational organized crime syndicates involved in all manner of black-market illicit activity.

"But it has exploded since Russia invaded" in February, according to Mariya Dmytriyeva, a Kyiv-based women's rights advocate for the Democracy Development Center, an NGO that works on the development of civil society and state of law in Ukraine.

Dmytriyeva said the many criminal mafias in and around Ukraine flock to sex trafficking because of the lax attitude toward it among authorities. The pimps, hustlers and crime syndicates responsible for it are rarely arrested and almost never prosecuted. And there are far more lenient penalties for those who are than for drug trafficking and other serious crimes.

"We know that organized crime is using this because it is much easier to sell a girl than to sell a bunch of cocaine," she said. "And there is this famous saying here that you can sell a kilo of cocaine only one time, but you can sell a 12-year-old girl until she dies."

In the nearly three months since Russia's invasion, the signs of sex trafficking have been everywhere, officials and experts report.

In Ukraine itself, hundreds of women and girls have reported experiencing sexual violence, including rape, to the country's officials who work for human rights.

Russian soldiers – and even some opportunistic taxi drivers – are suspected of facilitating the trafficking of women and girls or forcing them to flee into Russia where they fall prey to organized crime syndicates who exploit them, according to other advocates on the ground.

In neighboring countries Poland, Moldova, Romania, Slovakia and Hungary, where most Ukrainians initially landed, reports of suspected trafficking have spiked. An unknown number of the more than two million who have made it to points beyond also have been victimized, according to recent reports by the United Nations, the OSCE and numerous advocacy and humanitarian groups.

To help address the issue, the International Organization for Migration (IOM) Ukraine, has scaled up the work of the National Migrant Advice and Counter-Trafficking Hotline 527, by extending opening hours, doubling the number of advisers and offering reliable and updated information on a wide range of topics. The hotline, which can be accessed from within Ukraine, has



already provided over 12,000 consultations to over 2,400 callers received from 24 February to 16 March only, which is 60 percent more compared to the same period last year. More than half of the people calling are newly displaced persons. The hotline provides verified information on rights and obligations related to the current procedures of border crossing, services within Ukraine and neighboring countries, work of border-crossing points, safe travel and countering human trafficking.

Pope Francis Approves Canonization of Two Blesseds

In decrees approved on Saturday, May 21, Pope Francis approves the canonization of Blessed Giovanni Battista Scalabrini and Blessed Artemide Zatti.

THE VATICAN: Pope Francis will convene a consistory to canonize Bishop Giovanni Battista Scalabrini, raising to the altars a bishop already recognized throughout the world as a patron of migrants. Scalabrini, who served as Bishop of Piacenza, Italy, in the 19th century, is the founder of the Congregations of the Missionaries of St. Charles, which have as a special charism the mission of serving migrants.

Scalabrini's canonization was announced on Saturday at an audience granted to Cardinal Marcello Semeraro, the Prefect of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. Pope Francis also approved the canonization of Artemide Zatti, an Italian layman who emigrated with his family to Argentina in the late 1800s and who became a

Salesian co-worker and missionary in Patagonia. To read more, please click here

From Mother Cabrini, "Italian Immigrant of the Century" by Sr. Mary Louise Sullivan, MSC, PhD: Bishop Scalabrini, whose work on behalf of Italian emigrants to the Americas led him to seek out Mother Cabrini's assistance. Scalabrini and Mother Cabrini were to become the leading advocates on behalf of their brothers and sisters who were leaving Italy for distant lands to better their economic status.

It was at the time of her first trip to Rome that Mother Cabrini met Scalabrini, after having expressed to Vatican authorities her desire for papal recognition, the expansion of her institute to include a foundation in Rome and the possibility of missions in the Orient.

A letter directed to Cabrini at Rome from the pastor of Castel San Giovanni (Piacenza) mentioned Scalabrini, the man who was the single most important individual responsible for Mother Cabrini's decision to go to America.

Scalabrini was a man of learning, piety and compassion, he demonstrated a keen pastoral awareness of the political, social and economic matters of the day and their impact on the working class. The needs of Italians emigrating abroad became a major concern for Scalabrini. He sought to aid the cause of the emigrants with his writings and public addresses.

Archbishop Corrigan of New York had read of Scalabrini's new missionary institute of priests and asked Scalabrini to provide "good Italian priests" for the Italians of New York City. [However], after having met Mother Cabrini, Bishop Scalabrini must have decided that she and her new congregation of sisters, determined to be missionaries in fact as well as in name, were the religious women best suited to undertake the assistance of Italian immigrants in conjunction with the priests he would send to New York from Piacenza. Scalabrini wrote to Corrigan, "The sisters destined for New York will be the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, a new community, but stable and well experienced." Chapter Four, pages 35 – 41.

daughter of Eric and Melissa Brodtmann of Metairie. She will attend the University of Alabama in the Honors Program this fall to study Biomedical Engineering.


Sophie Brodtmann served on Student Council all five years, and was a

Totally Terrific Toddlers!

Cabrini Immigrant Services (CIS), Dobbs Ferry, NY, hosted a course entitled "Terrific Toddlers." The class was taught by Donna-Marie Lasco, a certified teacher and the owner of Terrific Twos©.

Pre-schoolers and their parent/caregiver were invited to the program. They met once a week from September 2021 through May 2022. The purpose of the program is to prepare children for the start of school and to help the parent/caregiver work with the child at home. Another important piece is to teach the children routine.

Each week the children would learn a color or a shape. The children wore clothes to match the color that was being learned in the class. Their clothes, the tablecloths, napkins and the snack also matched the color. When class started, everyone would create different shapes using Play-Doh. After that, they would play with a puzzle or matching colors game. When finished, the children would wash their hands, say a prayer and have a snack. There was a different activity every week. The toddlers would

either paint, glue different materials, etc. Each activity chosen had to do with either the color or the shape they were learning. Following that activity was reading time. Then the children would either play rhythm instruments, march, match shapes or play games such as 'Ring Around the Rosie.' Of course, everyone left with homework. It was usually an art project, which would follow-up on the lesson taught.

An extra special gift was that at the end of each semester, the toddlers received a copy of the books that were read during the program.

We saw a beautiful transformation in the toddlers. In the beginning, they would come in and tend to be quiet and stay close to their caregiver. It didn't take long before the children would walk in, go directly to their seats and begin their work. They are certainly prepared to begin Pre-K.



Leadership Makes the Difference

Communicate Hope

Above all at this time, vocation leaders need to communicate and engender hope through affirmation and sometimes, challenge. Sessions in community that generate seeds of hope, even on difficult days, can be invaluable in creating a context for inviting new life. The vocation leader must provide such hope for the regeneration of an invitational climate so that the shoots of new life appear.



Hope is essential for creating a context that is attractive to new members. In recent years of diminishment, however, it has become a difficult virtue and context to create. So I suggest that leaders in vocation ministry, indeed all leaders formal and informal, need to look for ways to engender hope in all they do. Otherwise, our lack of hope will send out negative messages and may itself become a self-fulfilling prophecy with respect to vocation. In my experience of offering hospitality in our homes, opportunities for praying with our members, open houses and social events not only provide an

opportunity for visibility and witness, but in turn bring hope. One of our larger communities held a young adult open house that included contemplative prayer, a vocation video, discussion and a pizza dinner. It brough great vitality to all the sisters who participated, both younger and older members.

Vocation leadership that includes affirmation and development of charism and community has the capacity to re-create a sense of grateful identity and an attractive context. For while a new generation has been deeply exposed to change and instability and are, thus, flexible, it is paradoxically those same conditions that attract them to ventures and groups that know and name clearly who they are and to what they are called. Identity, albeit an identity in transition, is critical. Reclaiming who we are and who we are becoming may well lead us to actively invite women and men to consider the possibility of a religious vocation.

Finally, which one of us, I wonder, doesn't "come alive" when our gifts are affirmed and called upon or when we are engaged in seeking and claiming the gifts of communal identity? Through these leadership processes, vocation ministers, with others, call out a lively and engaged joy, an essential component for a community that attracts.

Above all, together in mission and in shared leadership, we are called to witness to living joy and to be joy-makers! For as Pope Francis has said, "Only if our witness is joyful will we attract men and women to Christ." Leadership indeed!
