Hurricane Ian Rescue Efforts Continue: Catholic Parishes and Dioceses Respond

WASHINGTON (CNS) – As authorities

in Florida continued rescue efforts, Catholic parishes and dioceses in the U.S. moved rapidly to collect aid in the aftermath of Hurricane Ian, and U.S. President Joe Biden said it could take years to rebuild what was destroyed.

The Diocese of St. Petersburg, Florida will hold a special collection at its parishes in October to help with the damage, including the neighboring Diocese of Venice and is asking for others to help.

"Our hearts are moved with compassion for all those who have suffered damage and destruction due to Hurricane Ian, especially our brothers and sisters in the Diocese of Venice, St. Petersburg's Bishop Gregory L. Parkes said of the diocese that suffered the brunt of the damage. Archbishop José H. Gomez of Los Angeles, President of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, called on Catholics and all people of goodwill to pray for those who lost their lives in the Caribbean and the southeast United States due to the Hurricane.

"It's not a crisis for Florida. It's an American crisis," Biden said during his recent news conference. He said the situation on the ground was "far more devastating" than initially believed and "is likely to rank among the worst in the nation's history."

In the Diocese of Venice, Bishop Frank J. Dewane gave thanks for those who prayed for people in the path of the Hurricane Ian.

"Damage is still being assessed but it is clear that the devastation in the Diocese is widespread," he wrote. "There are crews already at work throughout the Diocese and Catholic Charities is putting a team into action." To read the entire account, please click here

Building the Future with Migrants and Refugees

For nearly a half century, the Catholic Church in the United States has celebrated National Migration Week, which is an opportunity for the Church to reflect on the circumstances confronting migrants, including immigrants, refugees, children, and victims and survivors of human trafficking.

National Migration Week for 2022 took place September 19-25, and ended with the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (WDMR), on the last Sunday of September. The primary theme for this year's WDMR was "Building the Future with Migrants and Refugees".

There has been an influx of migrants being sent to New York City this spring and summer, most fleeing crime and poor economies in Central and South America which has tested New York's reputation as a world sanctuary. And it shows no sign of slowing, thanks in part to Gov. Greg Abbott of Texas, whose decision to send busload after busload to Washington, D.C. and New York hoping to pressure Democrats on border policy.

Not all migrants who reach New York enter shelters; some go to live with friends and family in the region. But a large number of the recent newcomers are Venezuelan, and, unlike previous groups of immigrants from places like Mexico, El Salvador or Ecuador, they are less likely to have already established communities to join when they arrive.

Cabrini Immigrant Services, NYC, is starting to work with some of these families and in honor of National Migration Week, the Guadalupe Province Immigration Commission is collecting donations of cash and/or gift cards to places such as: Trader Joe's, Old Navy, Target, and also much needed New York Metro Cards. We are also asking for donations of underwear (in all sizes for both men and women).



Pope Francis: Saints Have Joyful Hearts, Not Long Faces

VATICAN CITY – The holiness of saints is reflected not only in how they overcame struggles but by their ability to transmit the joy that comes from being loved by God, Pope Francis said.

The gift of sharing the love and mercy Christians receive from God "enables us to experience an immense joy that is not a fleeting emotion or mere human optimism, but the certainty that we can face every challenge with the grace and the assurance that come from God," the Pope told participants at a Vatican conference on holiness.

"Without this joy, faith shrinks into an oppressive and dreary thing: the saints are not 'sourpusses,' but men and women with joyful hearts, open to hope," the Pope said today.

"The witness of a virtuous Christian life given daily by so many of the Lord's disciples represents for all of us an encouragement to respond personally to our own call to be saints," said Pope Francis.

Saints, he said, "do not come from a 'parallel universe', but are believers who belong to God's faithful people and are firmly grounded in a daily existence of family ties, study and work and social, economic and political life. The lives of holy men and women who have been beatified or canonized are also a reminder that "it is possible, and indeed rewarding to live the Gospel to the fullest."
